Thus, unfortunately, not all of our priorities are in the record, and we must use other means to determine legislators' positions on those issues until such time as there is an official vote. This record does, however, serve as a tool to help Iowa trade unionists access whether or not their elected representatives support a agenda that benefits all workers, organized or not.

This year we will also begin the practice of scoring the Governor's actions so members can understand the record of this branch of Government. Legislation that the IFL supported or opposed that a Governor signs, vetoes, or line-item vetoes will also be scored as well.

Bill Name & IFL Position	Bill Description
HF 2230—School Funding Passed Senate 28-21 IFL Position was "no" Signed By Governor in a different form (see below).	Again this year, the lowa Federation of Labor believed that the amount for school funding was set too low at 1%. The Federation believes that there should be at least 4%, yet the legislature's priority was tax cuts for the wealthy.
HF 2230—School Funding (voting on amended bill) Passed Senate 28-21 IFL Position was "no" Signed By Governor	After disagreeing with the House initially over transportation funding, the House later changed its position to address that issue in another bill. Again, the Iowa Federation of Labor rejects the idea that 1% growth is keeping up with inflation and that this legislature has misplaced priorities.
SF 2305 - Criminalizing Workers' Compensation Passed Senate 28-22 IFL Position was "no" Died in Senate	This bill would have set up a special prosecutor in the Insurance Division that was aimed only at prosecuting fraud in the case of workers. As soon as a company would accuse an individual of fraud, the claim would stop. There were many problematic parts of this bill, including the idea that this division would be funded in part by successful prosecutions, leaving open the possibility of a runaway prosecutor going after legitimate claims.
SF 2383 - 1st Senate Tax Cut Passed Senate 29-21 IFL Position was "no" Died in Senate	This \$1.2 billion tax cut aimed primarily at cutting taxes for the wealthiest lowans is unaffordable for a state budget that is making mid-year budget cuts. While some parts of the bill we applaud such as eliminating many corporate tax credits, the entire package was unacceptable and unbalanced for lowans.
SF 2117 - "De-Appropriations Bill" Passed Senate 28-21 IFL Position was "no" Signed By Governor	This mid-year budget cut was the second year in a row that mid-year budget cuts were deemed necessary by the Governor. These cuts were aimed mainly at the university system, and in particular the University of Iowa and Iowa State University.
HF 2233—Mechanic's Liens Passed Senate 26-21 IFL Position was "no" Governor Signed into Law	This bill allowed the amount demanded in a lien only to be adjusted downward and does not allow increases. This bill shortened the notice period for a public construction project, and also required one type of notice along with the certified statement that a notice was given.
HF 2297—Boiler Inspections Passed Senate 26-21 IFL Position was "no" Governor Signed into Law	This bill adjusted the law to no longer require an external inspection of a steel hot water boiler in a year when an internal inspection was done. It also only requires internal inspections for boilers taking more than six months in order to clean the vessel. This also exempts inspections for 120 gallons or less, and 200,000 BTUs or less.
HF 2253 - LEASE PURCHASE BIDS— Passed Senate 27-20 IFL Position was "no" Governor Signed into Law	Lease-purchase is a provision in lowa law that allowed public entities to enter into contracts with builders who would put up the initial monies for a project and then sell or lease that back to the public entity over a period of time. This change in "lease-purchase" bids for public entities took a valuable tool away from public entities when building projects. Lease-purchase now conforms to lowa's lowest bidder laws, similar to what happened when this legislature banned project labor agreements for local entities.

This tax cut also was unaffordable in a time when the state budget is going through mid year budget cuts. This tax cut was massively skewed toward the wealthiest lowans, and leaves lowa in a difficult position meeting the state budget needs going forward.

1	HF 2230—School Funding IFL Position was "Veto" Signed By Governor	Again this year, the lowa Federation of Labor believed that the amount is school funding was set to low at 1%. The Federation believes that the should be at least 4%, yet the legislature's priority was tax cuts for twealthy.								
2	HF 2297—Boiler Inspections IFL Position was "Veto" Governor Signed into Law	This bill adjusted the law to no longer require an external inspection of a steel hot water boiler in a year when an internal inspection was done. It also only requires internal inspections for boilers taking more than six months in order to clean the vessel. This also exempts inspections for 120 gallons or less, and 200,000 BTUs or less.								
3	HF 2233—Mechanic's Liens IFL Position was "Veto" Governor Signed into Law	This bill allowed the amount demanded in a lien only to be adjusted downward and does not allow increases. This bill shortened the notice period for a public construction project, and also required one type of notice along with the certified statement that a notice was given.								
4	HF 2253 - LEASE PURCHASE BIDS IFL Position was "Veto" Governor signed into law.	Lease-purchase is a provision in lowa law that allowed public entities to enter into contracts with builders who would put up the initial monies for a project and then sell or lease that back to the public entity over a period of time. This change in "lease-purchase" bids for public entities took a valuable tool away from public entities when building projects. Lease-purchase now conforms to lowa's lowest bidder laws, similar to what happened when this legislature banned project labor agreements for local entities.								
5	SF 2117 - "De-Appropriations Bill" IFL Position was "Veto" Governor signed into law.	This mid-year budget cut was the second year in a row that mid-year budget cuts were deemed necessary by the Governor. These cuts were aimed mainly at the university system, and in particular the University of Iowa and Iowa State University.								
6	SF 481 - Immigration Laws - IFL Positon was "Veto" Governor Signed into Law	This law (which was opposed by many law enforcement groups) allows and requires law enforcement to hold people that they might suspect might have committed a immigration violation or they would lose all state funding. Not only does this violate due-process rights of individuals, law enforcement already cooperates with Immigration and Custom Enforcement (ICE) on these matters and this bill was unnecessary, punitive, and political.								
7	SF 2417 - Governor's Tax Cut IFL Position was "Veto" Governor signed into law.	This bill was based off of the Governor's original tax cut plan. This tax cut also was unaffordable in a time when the state budget is going through mid year budget cuts. This tax cut was massively skewed toward the wealthiest lowans, and leaves lowa in a difficult position meeting the state budget needs going forward.
